### FALMOUTH HONORS THE MEMORY OF RACHEL CARSON ON EARTH DAY APRIL 22, 2020

**Whereas:** this year is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Earth Day; and

**Whereas:** Rachel Carson's book "Silent Spring" is credited with the launch of the environmental movement; provoked the passage of the Clean Air Act (1963), the Wilderness Act (1964), the National Environmental Policy Act (1969), the Clean Water Act and Endangered Species Act (both 1972), and led to the establishment of the Environmental Protection Agency in 1970; and

**Whereas:** Rachel Carson studied at Marine Biological Laboratory (MBL) in Woods Hole during the summer of 1929 where she had her first significant and subsequent encounters with the sea; and

**Whereas:** Rachel Carson returned to Woods Hole in subsequent years to work at MBL and later at the Fisheries Service (now National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration); and

**Whereas:** Rachel Carson the environmentalist and writer, wrote numerous magazine articles, essays and government documents and three sea books, "Under the Sea-Wind" (1941), "The Sea Around Us" (1951), "The Edge of the Sea" (1955). Her fourth and most environmentally impactful book was "Silent Spring" (1962); and

**Whereas:** Falmouth citizens and community organizations erected a life size bronze statue of Rachel Carson at Waterfront Park in Woods Hole in 2013; and

**NOW THEREFORE,** We, Megan English Braga, Douglas C. Brown, Douglas H. Jones, Susan L. Moran and Samuel H. Patterson, as Selectmen of the Town of Falmouth, by authority vested in us, do HONOR AND PROCLAIM

## Tree Warden's Assessment of Black Locust Tree Located on Queens Byway


Species: Black locust (*Robinia pseudoacacia*)

Condition: (Poor) tree has no crown and was topped several years ago and showing extensive signs of decay

### Assessment:

- Tree showed multiple signs (conks) of internal decay starting at root flare and continuing up stem.
- Poor rooting structure
- Nesting holes
- Tree has been topped
- Branch dieback starting from top of tree
- Large target (tree is leaning towards building and has significant structural defects listed above)
- Invasive species

Per the above information tree was deemed a significant safety hazard and was removed. Pictures below show clear reason for removal.

If there is no plausible safety risk to town staff (because they are working on the street/outside only), I cannot see a legal justification for selectively denying services that have been deemed Essential under the Governor's Order (water) on the effective basis of residency. I think it would raise equal protection issues and possibly MCRA claims of interference with lawful use of property.

However, if a time were to come where town resources are sufficiently strained (due to water department staff illness, or other emergency conditions) that the town does not have the capacity to meet these requests, I believe it would be

reasonable for the town to devise a "triage" order enumerating which water-related services will be provided and under what conditions (i.e. services only for life safety/habitability issues in occupied buildings).

If the BOH/Scott/the BOS believe that the influx of seasonal residents is posing a public health threat in light of virus transmission, the simplest way to address that within indisputable and equally applied public health authority would be to issue a strict "shelter-in-place" order, as the Vineyard towns and Nantucket did, and/or a mandatory 14 day quarantine order for arriving travelers (to date, Scott and the state are merely "advising" or "requesting" such quarantine).

Since our interchange yesterday, I have accumulated some more information. Indeed, the Water Dept is of course an essential service. However, the an entire department is actually not considered essential. For example Town Hall is closed to the public but is still functioning with its doors closed. The town of Orleans has just followed Mashpee as of yesterday by deciding not to turn on water services to second homes. They are able to do so because turning on water for second homes is actually *not* considered to be an essential service. This is not about xenophobia. This is not even about the concept of people unknowingly transplanting more virus to another community. It is about weight and drag on the system when they become sick while they are here. They don't have to bring it here. It is here now. This is about reserving the minimal services we have available to the Falmouth community in the coming weeks and months. This is also unfortunately about class status, yes...that's right, money. However, MV and Nantucket have also stepped up restrictions regardless of their dependence on wealthy part time residents. Dr Fauci himself has warned against people fleeing to their second homes. Based upon these examples, it appears that surrounding communities are taking bold steps in a time of extreme circumstances Choosing to err on the side of caution at this point seems reasonable to consider.

Regarding tradesman, I read yesterday that construction has been halted on both islands. Construction is not essential. Maintaining public safety with electricians and plumbers is essential. It is fine to refer me to the Governor's orders which I understand. The question is are you comfortable with having those orders out there and them not being followed. Think of that electrician that still believes in the great hoax, watching only FOX news who goes into 10 houses a day. That's one man, 10 houses, at least 10 contacts. Multiply that by 1000 or more. I have also sent my concerns to Representative Fernandes.

Hello Denise Marcoux,

Thanks for your email. As you may know, the Town of Falmouth water department continues to be open and operational, as we operate on a much larger scale in providing water than in the Town of Mashpee. To the best of my knowledge, Falmouth is not "denying" homeowners the ability to function with water at the residences they own. Should there be such a formal policy, it would have significant legal ramifications for the Town. Nor do I think that this would significantly alter decisions of homeowners to occupy the seasonal residences that they own.



Please find attached proposed changes to the Shellfish Regulations for Spring 2020. The proposed changes are being recommended due to the recent coronavirus pandemic. These changes will allow recreational shellfish permit holders to utilize the Bournes Pond Family Area as a means of feeding themselves and their families, ahead of the typical May 1<sup>st</sup> opening date.

Pursuant to MGL Chapter 130, Section 52, the following changes to the Shellfish Regulations are hereby adopted:

**Change in Recreational Harvest Areas**

**SOUTHERN BOURNES POND SC-13**

The waters of Southern Bourne's Pond (Family Area) shall be open to recreational harvesting of shellfish starting on Saturday, April 11, 2020 on **Saturdays and Sundays** only.

Dear Governor Baker,

The Board of Selectmen of the Town of Falmouth is concerned about the existence, storage and security involved with spent nuclear fuel at the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Plant in Plymouth. We are specifically writing to appeal to you to utilize all available means to ensure that the following critical items are acted upon at the earliest possible time:

1. That spent nuclear fuel be secured in better quality dry casks and hardened onsite storage;
2. That the spent fuel pool and casks be protected with heightened security to prevent intrusion in order to protect the health, welfare and economic interests of the Commonwealth and its communities including Falmouth.

We recognize that the high level nuclear waste from operations at Pilgrim will remain active and dangerous for an extraordinary time period. We further recognize that the spent fuel pool remains full and vulnerable to accident or terrorist attack risking widespread radioactive contamination. Thank you for your serious attention to this matter of public health and safety.

**Public Advisory Question for the 2020 Spring Town Ballot  
for increased security at the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station on Cape Cod Bay  
in order to protect the public and the environment**



**Whereas**, the high level nuclear waste will remain at Pilgrim for decades or more in dry casks that present safety concerns, each holding half the radioactive cesium released at Chernobyl;

**Whereas**, the spent fuel pool remains full and is vulnerable to terrorist attack or accident that could cause radioactive contamination rendering our communities uninhabitable;

**Whereas**, due to lack of proper security on the property, there has been open access beyond the posted 'No Trespassing' signs to within line-of-sight of dry casks and spent fuel pool;

**Whereas**, during decommissioning, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission has abdicated its responsibility to protect the public by approving exemptions requested by new Pilgrim owner Holtec for reduced offsite liability insurance, cybersecurity, and offsite emergency planning;

**Whereas**, safety is a human right;

**Whereas**, citizens of the Town of FALMOUTH find this to be an unacceptable threat to our health and safety and must be resolved in the most timely manner;

**Therefore**, shall the people of the Town of FALMOUTH direct the local government to communicate to Governor Baker and the State Legislature to employ all means available to ensure that: (1) spent nuclear fuel is secured in better quality dry casks and hardened onsite storage; and (2) spent fuel pool and casks are protected with heightened security to prevent intrusion in order to protect the health, welfare, and economic interests of the Town of FALMOUTH and its inhabitants and visitors?

QUESTION 3: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY THE TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO GENERAL PROVISIONS SUMMARIZED BELOW?

To enhance the clarity and consistency of Charter language, certain words and phrases are changed as follows: a) committees, councils and boards are to be referred to as governmental bodies; b) the Master Plan will be known as the Local Comprehensive Plan; c) the Long Range Plan will be known as the Strategic Plan; d) the Representative Town Meeting will be known as the Town Meeting; and e) the Registrar of Voters will be known as the Board of Registrars. Charter section C1-3 is amended to include a reference to governmental bodies to emphasize their importance in town governance. The Local Comprehensive Plan is defined as the community vision of the future. Charter section C2-14 is amended to rename the Watchman of the Warrant to Watcher of the Warrant. All provisions naming the Board of Selectmen are amended to rename the board as the Select Board

QUESTION 4: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO TOWN MEETING MEMBERSHIP SUMMARIZED BELOW?

The Representative Town Meeting shall consist of not more than two hundred and fifty two (252) members chosen for overlapping three year terms as determined by Chapter 349 of the Acts of 1935 and any amendments thereto. This amendment clarifies the authority for Town Meeting membership but does not change the number of members.

QUESTION 5: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO THE FINANCE COMMITTEE SUMMARIZED BELOW?

Charter provisions relative to the Finance Committee are moved from Article VIII, Financial Provisions and Procedures, to Article II, The Representative Town Meeting, to reflect its legislative function. A vacancy in Finance Committee membership may be filled by vote of Town Meeting at an annual or special town meeting. Certain duties and functions of the Finance Committee are clarified to conform to its duties and responsibilities found in town bylaws, including the approval of transfers from the reserve fund and coordination with department heads on budgetary matters. The Charter provision allowing members of the Finance Committee to serve on advisory boards in a non-voting capacity has been eliminated.

QUESTION 6: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND POLICY LEADERSHIP SUMMARIZED BELOW?

Section C3-3B, Policy Leadership, is amended to provide for the board to hold public meetings with other governmental bodies for consideration of the town's Master Plan and other planning and policy initiatives.

QUESTION 7: : SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY THE TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO BOARD OF SELECTMEN POWERS SUMMARIZED BELOW?

A new section C3-7H is added to the Charter granting to the Board of Selectmen the power and authority to adopt rules and regulations for the conduct of town business, the use of town real and personal property and other matters within the board's jurisdiction and set penalties for violations thereof.

QUESTION 8: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO PLANNING BOARD RECOMMENDATIONS SUMMARIZED BELOW? Section C4-6D, Planning Board, of the Charter is amended to require that all Planning Board recommendations on proposed amendments to the zoning bylaws include a written explanation of the proposed amendments consistency with the Master Plan.

QUESTION 9: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO APPOINTED TOWN BOARDS SUMMARIZED BELOW? Section C7-2A, General Provisions, of the Charter is amended to provide that the charter shall include reference to appointed town boards which are mandated or authorized by state law and which exercise regulatory or other authority. Sections C7-16 and C7-17 are added to the Charter to include among the appointed town boards included in the Charter the Community Preservation Committee and the Economic Development and Industrial Corporation

QUESTION 10: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO THE REVISION OF BYLAWS SUMMARIZED BELOW? Section C9-9, Revision of Bylaws, of the Charter is amended to provide that the Board of Selectmen shall ensure the bylaws are periodically reviewed and revised without a five year review as previously required. Bylaw review will now be a regular process.

QUESTION 11: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2019 RELATIVE TO THE HOUSING AUTHORITY SUMMARIZED BELOW? Section C4-7, Housing Authority, of the Charter is amended to provide that members of the Housing Authority shall be elected for five year overlapping terms in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth. The number of members of the Housing Authority does not change, but this amendment conforms to recent changes in state law regarding their election.

QUESTION 12: SHALL THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH APPROVE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY TOWN MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 12, 2109 RELATIVE TO THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS SUMMARIZED BELOW? Section C7-5, Board of Assessors, of the Charter is amended to exempt the Board of Assessors from the term limits imposed on members of appointed town boards by C7-2H of the charter.

RE: Resale of 110 Altons Lane 1B - Update

The affordable homeownership unit located at 110 Altons Lane 1B is in the re-sale process. The maximum re-sale price is \$162,500. Per the Affordable Housing Restriction, the owner notified the town of their intent to sell which starts a 90-day marketing period. This period will expire on April 20, 2020. The Monitoring /Resale Agent, Housing Assistance Corporation (HAC), has located an eligible purchaser and a home inspection has been completed with no major problems. Both the seller and the purchaser are motivated and cooperative. If this purchaser is unable to purchase, HAC has at least one additional eligible purchaser interested in the property.

If an eligible purchaser is located but is unable to secure mortgage financing to be able to complete the purchase of the property pursuant to the purchase and sale agreement within the 90-day period, the Monitoring Agent shall have an additional 60-days to locate another eligible purchaser. The purchaser would be required to enter into a purchase and sale agreement and purchase the property by the end of the 60-day period. This extension would expire on June 29, 2020.

In lieu of a sale to an eligible purchaser, the Monitoring Agent or the municipality or designee shall also have the right to purchase the property at the maximum resale price and the purchase shall occur within 90 days, or by April 20, 2020.

If an eligible purchaser fails to purchase the property within the 90-day period after receipt of the Notice of Intent to Sell, and the Monitoring Agent or Municipality or designee does not purchase the property during this period, then the owner may convey the property to an ineligible purchaser no earlier than 30-days after the end of this period at the maximum resale

price. The sale would be subject to all rights and restrictions provided in the affordable housing restriction.

While this sale has experienced some paperwork processing delays due to the COVID-19 pandemic at this time HAC believes that the sale will proceed prior to the expiration date of April 20, 2020. No FAHF funds have been expended to assist in this re-sale.

**RECOMMENDATION:** I recommend no action be taken at this time. Given the information that we have to date it is highly likely that this unit will sell to an eligible purchaser within the time guidelines.

- I. Environmentally friendly moorings such as those designed to keep all tackle components other than the anchor off the ocean floor, may be required by the harbormaster in any location or subtidal area that support rooted aquatic vegetation such as eelgrass and widgeon grass.

**ARTICLE IV, Mooring Regulations**

**§ 231-15.1. Promulgation of regulations. [Added ASTM 4-7-1997, Art. 24]**

- A. After public notice and public hearing, the Board of Selectmen shall promulgate rules and regulations to effectuate the purpose of this article. Notice shall be given at least two weeks prior to the public hearing by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the town and by posting with the Town Clerk and posting at the Harbor Master's office.
- B. These regulations shall define key terms and establish procedures of the registration of moorings, assignment of mooring space, establishment and maintenance of a waiting list, inspection of moorings, specifications for moorings, identification of moorings and assignment and collection of fees.
- C. Failure by the Board of Selectmen to promulgate such rules and regulations or a legal declaration of their invalidity by a court of law shall not act to suspend or invalidate the effects of this article.
- D. After public notice and public hearing, the Board of Selectmen may amend or otherwise modify these rules and regulations. Notice shall be given at least two weeks prior to the public hearing by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the town and by posting with the Town Clerk and posting at the Harbor Master's office.
